#### Maths

Counting small sets of objects accurately, saying a number name for each item.

Counting out from a larger set, eg. slices of bread to make toast.

Ordering pictures for making toast– what did we do 1st, 2nd and 3rd?

Comparing the height of two children, saying who is taller and who is shorter.

Recognising numerals on a number line and in the environment. Which numbers can you spot?

#### **Understanding the World**

Finding out about ourselves- our appearance, interests and things we are good at.

Discussing our similarities and differences.

Observing fruit and vegetables and describing what we see, feel and taste.

Making toast and observing changes.

Cooking soup- what happens to the vegetables upon heating?

Using equipment to observe - magnifying glasses, mirrors, etc.

Finding out about what has happened to the vegetables we were growing in the garden.

Going on an Autumn Walk and describing what we see, hear, etc. What changes have taken place in the environment since Summer?

#### Physical development

Begin PE sessions in hall

Learning to dress and undress ourselves for PE.

Travel in a variety of ways—running, hopping, jumping, skipping, etc. Travel at different speeds—fast and slow.

Using equipment such as bean bags, quoits, hoops, etc. Exploring different ways of using these.

Finger gym-dough disco, finger exercises.

Use a range of equipment to develop fine motor control—construction, modelling materials, paintbrushes, gardening implements, etc. Exploring pushing and pulling, to help get the Enormous Turnip out of the ground!

# Cross Curricular Numeracy Links and Problem solving

Measuring—comparing the weight of two objects, eg turnips. Which is heavier/lighter? Using a balance to compare weight.

Number line activities, eg identifying the missing number or the mixed up numbers on the number line

Finding different ways of sorting items around us, such as leaves found on Autumn Walk.

#### Reading and writing

Read, Write, Inc- begin to learn the sounds letters make in words and practise our letter formation

James and the Giant Peach– collecting and displaying words to describe the peaches we tasted.

But Martin!— talking about our special powers and help write a sentence about these under our portraits.

Best friends, special friends- making a card for a special friend.

The Little Red Hen- sequencing instructions for making toast.

Pumpkin Soup– writing a recipe booklet for soup, saying what we used and what we did.

Discussing our superpowers- what makes each of us special and unique.

Developing our friendships and talking about how we look after and care for each other.

Learning the expectations for behaviour; listening to instructions.

Learning about our new Reception Unit: where things are stored and how to look after them.

#### Expressive arts and design

Making friendship bracelets for each other.

# Communication and Language

Our main focus this half term is helping children extend their vocabulary and develop the confidence to speak about what they are doing, feeling, their interests and their opinions:

Thinking of actions that will help us remember and re-tell stories, such as 'The Little Red Hen.'

Display—Self-portraits; 'James and the giant peach'
