

## Music non-negotiables

Our music curriculum, delivered through Sing Up and Charanga, ensures every child receives a high-quality, progressive musical education that meets the National Curriculum for Music, the Model Music Curriculum, and school expectations.

Every child should have access to a progressive music education fostering a love and enjoyment for music. By following Southwick's Music scheme of work and instrumental unit for your year group, will ensure continuity and progression throughout the school to ensure music becomes embedded in each child's education

## Core Requirements

- Minimum of 1 hour per week of music teaching in Key Stages 1 & 2.
- Whole-class instrumental teaching (WCET).
- Every child engages in: singing, instrumental teaching, composition, listening, notation, and performance.

## Assessing Progression

Every unit should have a minimum of 2 videos uploaded to the shared drive in the Musical Evidence folder and renamed accordingly.

These should consist of:

**Step 1** - 1<sup>st</sup> attempt at the unit focus

**Step 6** - the final lesson-showing progression

• Any other video evidence or photos of written work
